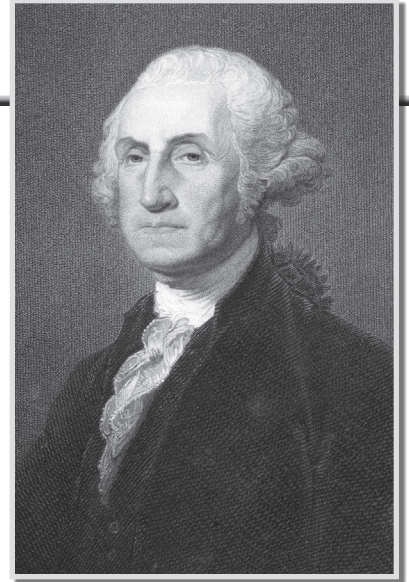

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The History of Presidents' Day

- 1732** George Washington was born on February 22. He lived until December 14, 1799.
- 1800** George Washington's birthday became a national day of remembrance for the first president.
- 1879** Washington's Birthday became a federal holiday in Washington, DC only. This holiday was on February 22.
- 1885** Washington's Birthday became a federal holiday for all of the United States.
- 1968** The Uniform Monday Holiday Act was passed. This bill stated that many federal holidays would take place on Mondays rather than the actual date of the holiday. Washington's Birthday was one of these holidays.
- 1971** The Uniform Monday Holiday Act took effect. Washington's Birthday would now be observed on the third Monday in February. Abraham Lincoln, who was also born in February (February 12, 1809) would also be honored on this day.
- mid-1980s** Many Americans started calling the Washington's Birthday holiday Presidents' Day. Presidents' Day is intended to honor all US presidents. However, the name of the federal holiday did not change. It is still called Washington's Birthday.
